My name is Lance David Ambrocio, an undergraduate student from the College of Architecture in the University of the Philippines Diliman, taking up Landscape Architecture. I had the most exciting opportunity to be a part of Meiji University's Japanese Language Winter Program last February. The two weeks program may seem short, but it was jam-packed with amazing experiences that I will never forget.

Q1. The reason/purpose of studying in Japan

Ever since I was a young boy, I've been fascinated by Japanese animation and manga. I'm especially fond of Studio Ghibli films, and I love reading works by manga artists such as Urasawa Naoki and Watase Yuu. Wanting to be able to watch anime and read manga without subtitles and translations, and being able to understand the cultural context of the stories drove me to start



studying Japanese by myself. This early interest in Japan urged me to join a Japanese-Philippines friendship organization at my university which has further expanded my horizons about Japan and has helped me create lasting friendships with Japanese students from various universities. Their experiences as an exchange student in the Philippines

inspired me to want to study in Japan as well.

Learning Japanese was a big challenge for me, especially since I've been put in the Intermediate Level class. It seemed that everyone was already well-versed in Japanese and was able to read some difficult kanji. This was my challenge since I really do

I was also exposed to the rich Japanese culture through the various activities such as, furoshiki and kitsuke. I wore a kimono and hakama, and got to walk around the streets of Ochanomizu like a samurai! The lovely and helpful student supporters also showed us around Tokyo, and I was just awestruck with all the sights and the delicious Japanese food that I got to savor. In addition to that, Akihabara, which is an area filled with Japanese anime and manga, is just one station away from Meiji University! So I can say that I now know every street and store in Akihabara.

In the future, I plan to return to Japan to study more Japanese and work in an architecture firm. I want to know more about Japanese designs and help create beautiful spaces that people can enjoy. I also want to see if I can apply as an artist in some animation studios, such as Kyoto Animation when I get better at my craft.
