Dr. Scott Drake

Associates Professor, Academic Coordinator at INDA, International Program in Design and Architecture, Chulalongkorn University, Bangkok, Thailand. The program has more than 300 students and employs 30 instructors from 9 different countries around the world. He is responsible for overview of all academic issues within the program, including curriculum development and review, staff recruitment, evaluation and training, as well as delivery of subjects in Architectural Design, Environmental Technology, and Theory and Philosophy of Architecture. Publications include two books published in the UK and Germany, peer refereed journal articles in national and international journals, and a large number of project reviews for Australian professional architecture journals. His most significant journal article was published the Journal of Architectural Education, published by the Association of Collegiate Schools of Architecture in the USA. That paper examines how ideas of phenomenology have been incorporated into architecture through a study of the Kiasma museum of art in Helsinki, Finland, by architect Steven Holl. He was the lead investigator on two research grants funded by the Australian Research Council to the value of more than AU \$300,000, looking at mixed mode and personal ventilation systems. He has undertaken international research collaboration with Professor Jeremy Myerson of the Royal College of Art, London, and funded by the Arts and Humanities Research Council (AHRC) and the Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council (EPSRC). titled the Welcoming Workplace, project examined potential changes to workplace design to take account of the physical needs of aging populations. Administration roles at Melbourne University included Assistant Dean (Facilities), responsible for coordinating changes to the buildings occupied by the Faculty.

The first major project was the refurbishment of the Baldwin Spencer building, a significant heritage building on Melbourne University' s Parkville campus. The project involved refurbishment of the building to provide new teaching, administration, and informal study areas for undergraduate students. The second major project was the coordination of the new building to be occupied by the Faculty from 2015.
