

Welcome to the School of Global Japanese Studies at Meiji University.


This is the English Track new student guidance.

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Today, we will mainly cover two topics.

First, we will explain about the Mission and Educational Objectives of the School of Global Japanese Studies.

Second, we will explain about the curriculum.


For the curriculum, we will look at the courses held in the SGJS, and courses that are held in other faculties.




Mission and Educational Objectives

Please see the Mission and Educational Objectives of SGJS. They are based on the Diploma Policy and the Curriculum Policy.

Our goal is for you to nurture a deep understanding of the cultures and societies of Japan and the world, and develop the ability to communicate this knowledge.



Next, is about SGJS courses.



At the SGJS, we have a Curriculum Policy to reach our educational goals.


The curriculum is divided into these five categories.

You will be studying these categories during your 4 years of enrollment.

The figure on the right shows how you will generally be taking courses.

In your first two years, you will mainly be focusing on required courses such as Japanese or English, ICT subjects, and General Studies.

On your third and fourth year, you can join a "Seminar," generally known as "zemi." Those of you who join a seminar will continue the same seminar for 2 years.



Next, about languages.

At SGJS, we have Japanese courses, English courses, and 5 other languages offered as a second foreign language.

These two English courses you see here are required courses for English Track Students. These courses are mandatory, and you need to earn credits for them. There are also some other English courses that English Track students can take as electives.

Japanese language courses are not required, but we encourage you to take them.


Although you are in the English Track program, strengthening your Japanese language skills will add value to your student life in Japan and your studies. If you get a job in Japan, or continue education in Japan, you will probably need to use your Japanese language skills in many situations.

For Japanese language classes, you will take a placement test. You will be placed in a level and course according to the results.

For details, please see the notice about the placement test.

Second Foreign Language classes are held in two levels: elementary and intermediate.

Please note that the second foreign language classes are instructed using the target language and Japanese.



General Studies courses are provided so that you can acquire knowledge and skills which you will need for any field or specialized areas.

In lecture style classes, instructors will speak to the students.


There are also many other course styles that you can take. In the Practicum in Global Japanese Studies, students plan and do research on various themes. Liberal Arts Studies is conducted in a small seminar format.

You can take many of the courses from your first year, so we recommend that you look into these courses and start soon.

Please note that as a English Track student, you are required to take two General Studies courses in your first year, and one General Studies Course course in your second year. We will explain about Introduction to Global Japanese Studies in the next slide.

ICT Basic I is a practical course which shows you ICT basics and PC literacy policies of Meiji University. This includes topics such as how to use the university email and the portal system, "Oh-o! Meiji."


The aim of Introduction to Academic Studies and Career Development is to prepare you for your third and fourth year, and for you to acquire the knowledge and skills for studying and researching in specialized fields.



Next, about the Introduction to Global Japanese Studies


Introduction to Global Japanese Studies is a course which provides first-year students an overview of Global Japanese Studies and your student life at the university. It is a introductory course which is intended to give you a common understanding of the educational goals and each area of study.

The latter half of each course will be held in omnibus style, and will have different instructors for each course.



Global Japanese Studies courses are designed to give you a deep understanding of Japan's industry, society, culture and international relations.

Global Japanese Studies has eight areas of study. The number of credits you need to earn from each area of study is not determined, so please choose courses based on your research theme and interests.



There are three language types for courses in the General Studies field and Global Japanese Studies field.

Type 1 courses are conducted only in English.

Type 2 courses are conducted with a mixture of English and Japanese.


For example, lectures may be conducted in Japanese using English textbooks or class materials.

The amount of Japanese language used in type 2 courses, and how Japanese is used depends on each course.

Finally, the third type of courses are the courses conducted in Japanese.

You can take any of these courses as an English Track student, but you will need to earn a certain amount of credits as required elective courses from Type 1 or Type 2 courses. This is one of the graduation requirements.

Courses conducted in Japanese are elective courses, and will not be counted as required electives.




Seminars are small sized interactive courses, and are taught by a professor in that particular field of study.

Students belong in the same seminar for both their third and fourth years.

Students decide their research themes, discuss them, and conduct their research.

To join a seminar, you need to go through the Screening which will be held in the fall semester of your second year.

Some seminars are held in English, or a combination of English and Japanese.




Next about study abroad courses.

If you join a Meiji University study abroad program, or an SGJS study abroad program, the credits you earn at the host institution may be approved as SGJS credits. Internships and volunteer programs may also qualify for approved credits. Please note that there are certain requirements.

The name of the approved course and number of credits that will be approved depends on the program you join, and the course you complete.

English Track students can join Study Abroad programs, but there may be restrictions. For example, there may be certain countries or areas that you cannot join. Please inquire at the office if you are interested.



Next, let's look at courses that are not held by the School of Global Studies.



We will look at courses that are not held by SGJS, based on the language they are held in.

The International Undergraduate Program is conducted in English.

This program is a collection of English courses which are held in other faculties.

The program has 4 categories.

Many of the courses are held in either Surugadai campus or Izumi campus.

For courses held in Japanese, there are mainly 3 types of courses.

Elective courses from other faculties are courses you can take from faculties outside SGJS.

Inter-faculty programs are courses that are open to students of all faculties.

The Certification Program has programs for 5 types of certifications in Japan, such as the course for secondary school teachers. Students can get the certification by earning credits for the courses.

These courses are all held in campuses other than Nakano.
