<b>Contents</b>	This course provides the incoming freshmen with fundamental theories of business, along with introduction to various areas of business. The purpose of this course is to help students become business leaders that are true to the mission of KUBS, "Business for Society – Inspiring Next Leaders." At the dawn of modern business education, Joseph Wharton emphasized, "Business education should find solutions to the social problems inherent in our civilization, and business leaders should be community builders who are responsible to society's shared needs." Based on this educational philosophy, the first half of this course seeks to engage students in the discussion of business philosophy, leadership, business ethics, and the theory of the firm, so that students realize the importance of pursuing social value while seeking business profit. The emphasis will be placed on learning how to create social value in doing business. In the second half of the course, seven functional areas of business, namely, management, accounting, finance, MIS, marketing, LSOM, and international business will be introduced, again emphasizing how social value can be created vis-à-vis firm value in each area of business.
